HENRY BULL DEAD AT RAPIDS

FORMER PETOSKEY MAN PASSES AWAY

As the result of the lung trouble contracted while attending to lumber interests last year, Henry Bull, sixty-eight years of age, a former resident and business man of Petoskey, died Monday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. W. Palmer, at Grand Rapids.

Mr. Bull was most active in Petoskey's industrial life in 1895, at which time he was a member of the firm of Bull, Bauerle & Jones, which manufactured Indian clubs, ball bats, dumb-bells and variety turning, shipping the products to the jobbing trade in various parts of the country. This factory was first operated near the present location of the block factory, and later on the site now occupied by the paper mill. While here Mr. Bull had some prominence in public life, being at one time a member of the board of works.

Since his removal from Petoskey about twelve years ago, Mr. Bull has conducted lumber business on a small scale at Grand Rapids. His work in the woods resulted in frosted lungs, which were the cause of death.

In addition to the widow, the deceased is survived by two daughters, Mra F. L. Clemens, of Deadwood, South Dakota, and Mrs. A. W. Palmer, of Grand Rapids; a brother, Frank Bull, of Enid, Okla., and a sister, Phoebe Bull, of Honoeye Falls, N. Y.

Mr. Buil held a membership in the Petoskey lodge of Masons.
