BIG WILD WEST SHOW IN PETOSKEY MONDAY

With His Aggregation of Daring Cowboys, Indians and Rough Riders, Young Buffalo Comes Here in Twenty Cars

With a program replete with thrilling exhibitions of rough riding, the subjugation of vicious bronchos, feats of daring in the saddle, expert work with the lariat, realistic Indian fights, dances and massacres, a portrayal of the historic Deadwood stage-coach holdup, work by a marvelous trained equine, an exhibition of sharpshooting in which a young woman risks her life as a near target and other exciting events. Young Buffalo's Wild West and Texas Rangers will show in Petoskey next Monday, August 15, in the afternoon and evening. The exhibition will take place on the Washington Street show grounds.

Big Aggregation

Early life on the frontier as it was when the hardy spirits, undaunted by bloodthirsty Indians or renegade outlaws, laid the foundation for the peace and prosperity which has replaced lawlessness and bloodshed, will be portrayed by the show's big aggregation of cowboys, cowgirls, Indians, broncho "busters," rough riders and dare-devils from Montana, Wyoming, Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

In twenty big cars the 300 performers and attaches of the show, with more than 150 range horses, bronchos, burros, Indian ponies, oxen, wild cattle and steers will arrive Sunday over the G.R. & I. Railroad.

Show To Parade

The show will parade through the principal streets of the downtown section, starting from the show grounds at 10 a.m. The performances will be given "rain or shine," it is announced.

Among the other features of interest will be a sensational wrestling match with a Texas longhorn, the riding of wild steers, a presentation of the "pony express," facts of skill and daring in the saddle, sports and pastimes of the cowboys and cowgirls, fancy rope throwing and spinning and many other events which, it is declared, will keep the spectators in alternate spells of laughter and excitement. Besides the attractions in the main tent, there are two side shows, filled with freaks of nature. The events will be run off in rapid succession, accompanied by the stirring strains of Young Buffalo's Celebrated Cowboy Band.

TWENTY OX TEAM HIT OF WILD WEST Old-Time Emigrant Train A Feature Many Unique and Thrilling Features Promised for Young Buffalo's Wild West Show

The unique sight of twenty oxen executing odd twists, and turns, circling in and out of a moving, old-time emigrant train, cutting the figure "8" and doing other bizarre stunts while attached to an old-fashioned lumbering prairie team of pioneer days, will be one of the special features at young Buffalo's big wild west show which exhibits here next Monday, Aug. 15, on the Washington Street show grounds.

The whole series of maneuvers is accomplished by Col. Henry Stevens, seventy-four years old, probably the oldest living ox team driver of national fame in existence today, who controls the oxen simply by the crack of his long whip and work of mouth.

Col. Stevens drove oxen during the Civil War and he is accredited with having forgotten more than any ox team driver of recent years knows, and is then in the van when it comes to making oxen subservient to human commands and the tingle of the whip.

"Haw, Bill! Giddalong! Gee Haw! rings out the cheery voice of old Col. Stevens, accompanied by the suggestive crack of his long whip and lo and behold, the "dumb, driven cattle," which are not supposed to know enough to come in out of the rain, are made to execute the most wonderful movements, while the spectators never fail to enthuse to a high pitch, culminating invariably in bursts of sincere applause.

The big show will arrive here in a special train of twenty cars over the G.R. & I. Sunday.

After the street parade which starts from the show grounds at 10 a.m. on Monday the cavalcade will return to the show grounds and prepare for the afternoon performance which starts at 2 o'clock. The night show begins at 8 o'clock.

There are said to be three hundred performers and attaches with the show and more than one hundred and fifty bucking bronchos, wild range horses, steers, Indian Ponies, burros, educated equines and trick donkies with the aggregation which includes the most daring rough riders, cowboys, cowgirls and Indians it has been possible to round up from Montana, Wyoming, Texas, New Mexico and Arizona.
